

New Community, New Way of Life

The Christian Church appeared in history not only bringing a new teaching and worship of God, but also as a newly organized community. Its goal is the inclusion of humanity. God established the Church as a new paradise, as a "world within the world," in order to attract the people of the world and save them from sin and injustice. The Church resembles the Ark of Noah, which did not sink with the world, but rather saved the people who were in it from the floods of sin and death.

The purpose of the Church as God's New Community is to redeem, sanctify, and deify its members, to make them truly members of the Body of Christ. "As many of you as have been baptized into Christ, put on Christ" we chant in Baptism, the Sacrament that initiates us in God's New Community, the Church. Repeatedly we ask the candidates for Baptism to renounce Satan, the evil ruler of this world, and to acknowledge Christ, the Founder and Savior of the New Community. All those who believe, accept, and commit their total lives to Christ are saved. They are incorporated in His Body and are fed continuously with His Divine Grace.

As a new Community, the Church takes the place of the old world and teaches its members new ways to relate to people around them. Inspired by the example of Christ and motivated by His love for us, the early Christians gave us two models of Community. After Pentecost, the Christians of Jerusalem held everything in common, as is the practice in the cenobitic monasteries. When Christianity spread among the Gentiles, the Christians continued participating in the Lord's Supper and sharing the Love Feast after Holy Communion. In addition, they collected the "logia," the "offerings," and sent them to the poor Christians of the Church in Jerusalem.

Christianity does not only care about the spiritual needs of its members, but also about their material needs. There was always a Philoptochos – a philanthropic spirit in the New Community – which responded to the needs of the faithful. The benevolent institutions we support



today had their beginnings in the Church. The new Pan-Orthodox philanthropic institution - IOCC (International Orthodox Christian Charities) is a praiseworthy example of our response to our suffering and indigent brothers and sisters in other lands. It deserves our wholehearted support, together with the other philanthropic organizations of our Church.

As members of the Church, our words and deeds, our total behavior, are motivated and colored by our faith in Christ, who loved us and gave His life to save us. Our example must be Christian at all times, so that others will be attracted to Christ and become members of His New Community.

Treasurer's Corner

Greetings again to all and Christos Anesti! Spring is certainly a time for renewal, and change, and that is indeed the case with me being offered the opportunity to (re)join the Parish Council as Treasurer last month. I humbly accepted the offer and am now setting to work getting back up to speed on your parish's financial business.

To kick things off, I would like to give you a brief snapshot of how we are fairing as we closed out the first 3 months of 2010. The year is young, but in a nutshell, I see we are trending fairly typically against our budget. Note that the large share of Pascha income is not included in this YTD snapshot. continually getting blindsided with "emergency needs" of funds to address the large pool of deferred maintenance across our campus. Today, we have a dedicated fund, that comes from a portion of the Festival proceeds, as well as a focused maintenance committee that has the charter to move ahead proactively to address the needs of our physical assets.

Secondly, I am encouraged to see that through the economic downturn last year, our stewards rightly kept their focus on giving their best gift to their church. I also see however, that our longstanding goal of clearing our entire operating budget through stewardship alone remains just that, a goal. In fact, our stewardship growth rate remains the largest barrier against the goals that we have as a cathedral, and a community. My family has been impacted by the financial pressures of the past couple of years as well, but I encourage you to strive, as we are striving, to put forward your first gifts to the church. A small increase by all of us, say, \$200/year as a goal, would finally give us powerful options.

News from Ahepa

The second of four regional AHEPA banquets took place at the Marriott Hotel, Portland, Oregon on March 6, 2010. The purpose of these banquets is to allow the Order of Ahepa the opportunity to honor outstanding individuals from throughout the United States for their contributions to their profess-ions. Present that evening was Ahepa Supreme President Nicholas Karacostas, all of the members of the Supreme Lodge, and Supreme Governors from throughout the country. It was an honor to introduce the Honorable Ioannis Andreades,

Consul General of Greece in San Francisco. We welcomed him to Portland and asked him to make a few remarks.

That evening Supreme President Karacostas announced the \$250,000 donation from E. John Rumpakis to initiate the Portland State University Hellenic Studies Program. Karacostas also presented E. John with the Ahepa Supreme President Award of Excellence in recognition of his untiring efforts in preserving and promoting Hellenism in the United States. Over the years, E. John has received numerous awards and has been recognized as a leader in the Real Estate industry.

Also honored that evening was Oregon Senator Ron Wyden who was present to receive the Ahepa Paul E. Tsongas Award for Public Service. Oregon Congressman Earl Blumenauer was also present to receive the Ahepa Pericles Award. Both men praised the Order of Ahepa and commented on their long relationship with the Greek community of Portland. It was also a pleasure to recognize other outstanding individuals who excelled in their professions. Honored that evening was Dr. Harry Anastasiou, Professor of International Peace and Conflict Studies, Conflict Resolution Graduate Program, Portland State University.
